COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKER PROGRAM

A community health worker (CHW) is a frontline public health worker who is a trusted community member. They build relationships with patients and connect health and social services in the community. CHWs help patients achieve health goals by addressing each patient's unique needs outside the hospital or clinic setting.

HOW CAN A CHW HELP?

Along with primary care providers, our CHW can help patients achieve health goals and assist with health care plans. A CHW may provide resources and educational information or connect patients to outside help such as support groups, online apps, or other programs. A CHW can also act as an accountability partner to help patients build skills to manage chronic conditions, mental health, substance abuse and addiction or any other specific health challenge they may face. Our CHW can also connect patients to both health and social resources they may qualify for or need.
